Australia - New South Wales Educational – November 2014



Here is some useful trivia....The UK can fit 3.5 times into Australia, it is a vast country and the key to a successful trip down under is taking good advice. I have just returned from an educational visit to Sydney & the surrounding areas with colleagues visiting Perth, Cairns, Ayers Rock, Brisbane and Melbourne, I believe Westway Travel are in a position to give quality advice.

Typically clients spend 3 to 4 nights in Sydney and this report will show that if you have the time you should spend longer in New South Wales as there are many great places to visit within 3 hours of Sydney.

There are many flight routes to choose from when travelling to Australia. I think you need to ask yourself what's more important, the most direct route which is British Airways with a touchdown in Singapore, the most reasonable which is normally Malaysia Airlines via Kuala Lumpur, or by your preferred stopover location and the most popular stops are Singapore/Hong Kong/Bangkok. I travelled with Emirates and Qantas whose schedules allow for a choice of stopovers including Dubai. The service was good and I would recommend it

I would like to give you an insight into the places I have experienced and this will then help us to plan what's most important to you in your trip 'Down under'.

Sydney


Sydney is a vibrant city with so much to see and do and a must is The Sydney Opera House and if you are game, the Sydney Bridge Climb.

Getting to The Rocks/Circular Quay from Sydney airport can be organised 2 ways, the most direct is a taxi and one way is approx \$50. The second is by rail, there is a direct route into the city which costs approx \$16 one way and from there a 10 minute walk into Circular Quay. Shuttle services are unreliable and buses only offer an indirect service into the city, so I would not suggest them.

There are two main areas I recommend in Sydney. The Rocks near Circular Quay

The Rock, Circular Quay is definitely the most popular & convenient way to see Sydney at its best, you are right in the middle of all the action!! Sydney Harbour and Opera house a short walk away. With a more central position the cost of hotels does increase. Alternatively consider Darling harbour, there are a few unique selling points, the harbour area has a great selection of restaurants and to try and promote the area, they provide a spectacular firework display every Friday/Saturday evening. Also the hotels are more reasonable and the main reason for this is Circular Quay/The Rocks is a 30 minute walk away or 10 minutes in a taxi. So if you are only here for a few days I definitely would always choose The Rocks/Circular Quay for my proposed stay.


Ferries

Can there be a better way to travel around one of the most beautiful harbour cities, than by ferry? There are regular ferry services to Manly, Sydney Olympic Park, Taronga Zoo, plus many other locations. This certainly beats jumping in a cab!

Things to do in Sydney



A trip to Sydney would not be complete without doing The Sydney Opera House and The Sydney Harbour Bridge! Sydney Opera House was phenomenal... let us make time in your schedule to take in one of the spectacular plays or Opera performances at The Sydney Opera House, I guarantee you, it will leave a lasting impression. Afterwards why not have lunch or dinner at The Opera Kitchen, it's next door to the opera house, it's absolutely buzzing, the food is excellent and the views over the harbour are beautiful. Sydney Harbour Bridge climb is a must and I will mention more about this later on.



Another unique view of Sydney, if you find the bridge climb is not for you is The Sydney Tower Eye. <u>http://www.sydneytowereye.com.au/?gclid=CKvhhuWTvsICFUWWtAodYFUATQ</u>

This is the tallest structure in Sydney, with 360- degree panoramic views across the skyline and this gives you a completely different perspective to that of the Bridge climb.



Bonza Bike Tours https://www.bonzabiketours.com/sydney/home.php

gives you the chance to see Sydney from the ground looking up!!. I can book this for you, at a time/date to suit you it lasts 1.5 hours approximately and is a great way to see the city instead of a taxi ride!!!



Taronga Zoo <u>http://taronga.org.au/taronga-zoo</u> is only 12 minutes by ferry into breathtaking Sydney harbour. To make your visit that much special, let Westway Travel book an Aboriginal Discovery Tour they will take you on a journey through Taronga as you hear stories of Australian wildlife told through the perspective of an Aboriginal guide, with tales of their shared history with the animals and land.



Bondi Beach



25 minutes from Taronga Zoo takes you to Bondi Beach.

Bondi Beach is a beautiful iconic part of Sydney with crystal clear water's and good waves for surfing. There are lots of great places to eat and drink at either end of the price spectrum. For lunch I recommend 'The Bucket List restaurant' for the best Fish and Chips I have ever tasted!!!

The bridge climb cost's from \$148 per adult and lasts approx 2.5 hours.


This is an incredible experience that you should tick off your 'bucket list'!!!



Hunter Valley
